Investigating Post-Fire Water Quality

They were there to protest what they called a lack of transparency in the government actions taken in the aftermath of the Palisades fire. ... Annelisa Moe, associate director of science and policy and water quality scientist at the non-profit organization Heal The Bay in Santa Monica, told the Guardian, "In a situation like this, unfortunately, there are no good answers, and there isn't really a 'better place'.

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In the wake of the devastating Palisades Fire, concerns about water quality have risen, especially with more rain on the way. ... Environmental advocates with Santa Monicabased Heal the Bay are actively collecting water and sand samples to test for bacteria levels and other contaminants like heavy metals and PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls).

"It is those households that are relatively isolated, that were built maybe 40, 50, 60 years ago, that have a relatively shallow well that are most vulnerable to this contamination," said Patrick Pulupa, executive officer of the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board. ... " Read more from ... So we are again asking a lot of our ocean right now," said Annelisa Moe, the associate director of science and policy with the Santa Monica-based nonprofit Heal the Bay.

At the same time, environmental nonprofit Heal the Bay is raising concerns about the county's recent declaration that the sand is safe for recreation. ... Heal the Bay and the Regional Water Quality Control Board have collected sand samples from throughout the burn area and are awaiting results. The nonprofit plans to release its ocean water and sand testing results to the public as soon as they become available.

The Los Angeles county department of beaches and harbors said last week that officials were monitoring beach conditions and ocean water quality. ... The department of public health lifted the ocean water quality rain advisory last week for all Los Angeles county beaches except those affected by fire. Beaches from Las Flores beach to Santa Monica state beach were still under advisory warnings. ... "The fires burn also through vegetations that normally will help stabilize soil," said Tania Pineda-Enriquez, waterquality data and policy specialist at Heal the Bay, an environmental advocacy group. "Without this natural barrier, all the ash and soil will be washed out into the waterways."

The agencies that would usually organize cleanups in these areas, like Heal the Bay, are stopping all cleanups until they see more testing from the Department of Health. ... Public Health also asks people to avoid visible fire debris."

Their advisories recommend people stay away from the water and the debris, but Heal the Bay's advisory goes beyond that, asking people to stay "away from the sand."

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But, perhaps less obvious, is the serious threat of toxic chemicals in fire-ravaged areas that gets washed into waterways, threatening water quality, public health and the environment, according to the State Water Resources Control Board. ... Ash to action: Heal the Bay's post-fire water quality investigation

"On Monday, February 24, 2025, Heal the Bay learned that the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH) had stated that

# Palisades Fire: A Case Study in Coastal Devastation

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Getting back in the water after any kind of tragedy is a natural reflex for surfers. ... That included toxic chemicals and debris burning in the fires potentially finding its way into the ocean.

Surfers in the Los Angeles area should still exercise the same precautions, according to Heal the Bay and the County Department of Public Health.

Heal the Bay, a local environmental non-profit, warned that the area must build "more resiliency" to protect the natural world.

"Horrific fires always impact the shoreline habitat and water quality, as detritus and runoff from the destruction inevitably flow to the Bay. ... Rainfall can reduce the intensity of fires if there is enough of it. "The moisture from the rain can reduce the intensity of the fire by wetting any existing fire fuel, such as trees and plants," the Western Fire Chiefs Association said in an explainer article.

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The department advised beach users to avoid all water contact, particularly near discharging storm drains, creeks and rivers due to potential debris from fires and contamination.

The advisory was issued "out of an abundance of caution due to runoff from current fire-fighting efforts." ... Local environmental nonprofit Heal the Bay stated Thursday that it is "deeply saddened and devastated" by the wildfires, with current and past staff members losing homes in the blazes.

Meanwhile, Heal the Bay has also issued cautions for the public, saying runoff sediment and ashes are impacting ocean waters as well.

On its website, the nonprofit advised as of Jan. 17 that county beaches were closed in the fire zones.

"There is no public access to any L.A. ... "The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health is extending the duration of the Ocean Water Advisory due to fire debris runoff," the most recent county health post from Jan. 17 reads. "Ash from the Los Angeles Fires may enter coastal water through surface water runoff and windblown ash.

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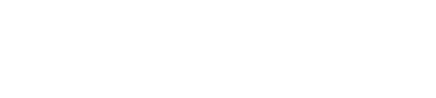
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
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
