Dear Dr. Isbell:

I am forwarding under separate cover a 20 gm. sample of material that would appear to be of great interest to you. This compound is reputed to be a very potent antagonist of barbiturates. The pharmacologist who has been studying its action claims that it is "infinitely superior to megitimine". He also states that "it is not a convulsant material, it has very low toxicity and that it acts by displacing the barbiturate from the site of action rather than by general stimulation".

I have more of this material on hand and it is quite readily obtainable. I will be able to furnish more precise information later but at present the above information and the fact that the LD<sub>50</sub> in the rat is greater than 300 mg/kg. is all that I can tell you.

It occurred to me that if this material turns out to be as advertised for the barbiturates, it might be well to try it versus alcohol for sobering effects.
