1. On 2 March 1953, [REDACTED] and the witness (later A, A, S, C)

arrived in [REDACTED] interviewed with the [REDACTED] [REDACTED]. The reason for this visit was that they [REDACTED] possible to use [REDACTED] in operation [REDACTED] and which to find out whether or not [REDACTED] 6, D, F

1. He had too much knowledge from a radical point of view (arthritis, degages, locomotions, drugs, etc.) from our previous treatment work and [REDACTED]
2. From a security point of view, could he give too much information to the [REDACTED] if he could talk directly to them? H

2. [REDACTED] expressed the professional opinion formed at the ANTHONY'S work in June 1952 who commented that [REDACTED] would not have any valuable knowledge of the ANTHONY'S techniques. He stated that in his opinion [REDACTED] believed he was given a medical treatment and that quantities used of him were of a medical nature and not for interrogation.

Further stated that he felt that in consideration of the part [REDACTED] would have total memory for such that went on during June when ANTHONY'S treatment was applied. He also stated he would have no knowledge of the chemicals, toxicology, personalities, etc. that might be of value to those [REDACTED] be sold out. In connection with the trip in August 1953 [REDACTED] stated he believed [REDACTED] would know that he had been subjected to drugs since his behavior was not normal and was "spaced out" in an intelligent, sharp, hard-core agent type. [REDACTED] stated it would not make any difference any way since [REDACTED] was not asked pertinent or intelligence-type questions and certainly would have no knowledge of chemicals given since they were put in coffee, beer, and in his food. H, C, E, D

3. [REDACTED] stated he felt from a medical point of view, there would be no real harm in using [REDACTED] in another operation and that if [REDACTED] sold out to the [REDACTED] he could give them no truly valuable information and if he did give this information, the information would do no harm in case he was [REDACTED] could give no factual details. C, D, H

5. In connection with the statements made by [redacted] he stated he had been given time for interpretation. He expressed the opinion that [redacted] recognized the fact that he was given chemicals during the [redacted] process but that he would have very little other information and he felt that [redacted] statements were simply designed to serve his own ends and were based on an intelligent guess and not much more.
