SUBJECT Sample of Piper Mathysticum

The enclosed sample of the rhizone of <u>siper rethysticun</u> is sent to you per our telembone conversation yesterday. I understand from people who have been exposed to the decoction that it has a profound effect. In small quantities (one-half a coconut shell of the liquid) it causes complete peralysis for 3 to 4 hours, with loss of connectousness for about half that time. The local practitioners frequently use it as an anesthetic when drawing teeth.

The traditional method of preparation of the k'ava is to chew the root until it is impregnated with saliva, pound it in a wooden bowl, cover it with water, let it stand for 4 hours, then strain.

I have not tried this variety; however, the taste of the liquid made from the <u>dried</u> root in Fiji is reminiscent of the smell of distrator and locks as though someone had washed dirty fee creum plates in it.
